Rocky Mountain-style storm. Snow, lightning, and a down-pour washed out the morning's play.

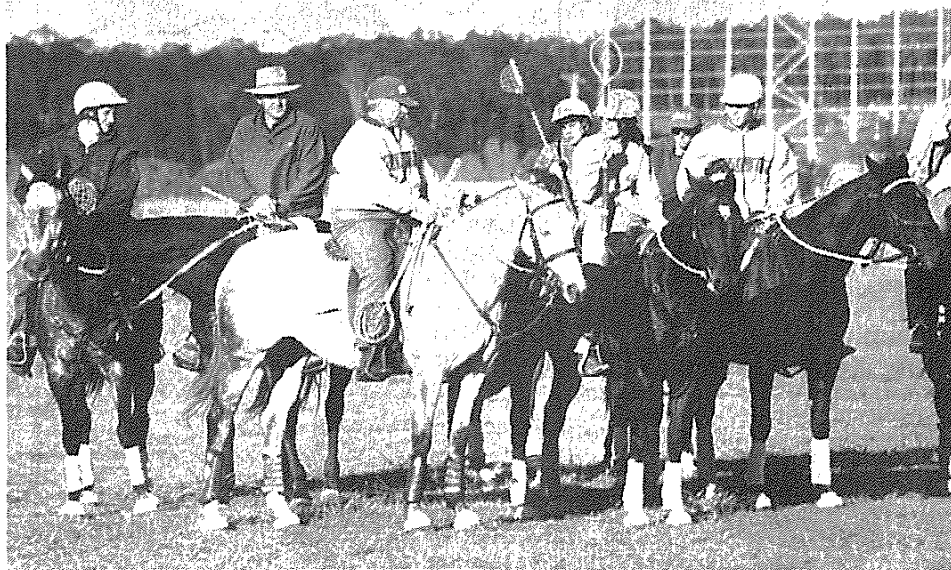
But as it is the long days of summer in the US, play continued until 8pm.

Bradleys High Risers Continue to Soar.

At the annual Gulgong Polocrosse carnival Bradley's High Riders arrange our family team to play in honour of our brother, father and uncle, Bradley Edwards. This year I was out due to a back injury and my sister Yvonne Giffin had a late call up, much to her distress. (not being a regular rider and has not played polocrosse she was very nervous). Also, in the team Bradley's in order of photo, brother Paul Edwards, brother in law Brian Honeyman, daughter Emily Edwards, nephew Harry Giffin and Harry's wife, Emily.

Bradley was a Police Officer serving the people of NSW for over 30 years. He seen things that a lot of us thankfully don't have to face every day, as a result he suffered depression, anxiety and PTSD. We as a family and Brad himself reached out for support from community services and even though he was an intelligent and educated man he found the mental health system difficult to navigate as did we. Despite the fact Yvonne and I work in an industry that often refers to mental health services at times we could not get the help required to keep him safe and with us. In 2021 Bradley sadly succumbed to his demons and took his own life. He had begged for help that come too late devastatingly.

I started raising money to raise suicide awareness and support for people suffering what Bradley did and for their families. I have held an auction and Facebook fundraisers since the Gulgong Polocrosse commenced their family fun competition. Gulgong club generously donates their venue, assistance and support to allow me to do this much needed fundraising. The money this and last year has gone to the Black Dog Ride Charity.

This year I also choose to raise money for oesophageal cancer, which took the life of my father John Edwards. My dad battled this aggressive and somewhat rare cancer for around five years. I want to raise awareness and funds to support the Mark Grundy Oesophageal Awareness Group which assists people suffering and their families and offers education and awareness of the disease.

My niece, Jacqueline, husband Todd and their son Reggie, received amazing support from the Ronald McDonald House when Reggie was born extremely premature. Jac suggested we raise money for this charity as well to help people from the "bush" get additional support education and services when they have sick babies in children in hospital receiving lifesaving care.

I could not do this without my incredible sponsors; they blow me away each and every year with their kindness and generosity. I really can't thank them enough.

HORSE WELFARE

Update

We're excited to bring you a monthly horse welfare article featuring expert advice from our qualified veterinary specialist and newly re-appointed state horse welfare officer, Tom Burke. The NSWPA Board would like to sincerely thank Tom for taking on this role again in 2025. Each month, Tom will share valuable insights on horse care, health management, injury prevention, and key signs to watch for in your equine partners.

HOT TOPIC

Scientific studies focused on specific equine sports such as polocrosse are rare. Typically, when seeking ways to support polocrosse athletes, we rely on data extrapolated from more extensively researched disciplines like racing or eventing. Nevertheless, there is at least one notable study dedicated to examining the cardiovascular demands placed on horses during polocrosse competition. I thought it may be of interest to summarise the findings in this month's newsletter.

A study conducted on Australian Stock Horses and Thoroughbreds measured physiological responses during play using heart rate monitors and GPS tracking.

Key findings include:

- **Average distance per game:** 4.72 km; horses in attack (Position 1) covered the most (5.32 km).
- **Average velocity:** 11.53 m/sec; Position 1 horses reached higher speeds, up to 42 km/hr.
- **Heart rate:** Maximum recorded was 224 bpm; mean rates ranged from 119–150 bpm, similar between chukkas.
- **Energy expenditure:** Averaged 0.55 MJ NE/min, with Position 1 horses expending more energy than others.
- **Workload:** Energy used equates to about 1.9 times maintenance requirements, like NRC's "very heavy work" category.

Any opportunity to understand better how horses are responding to playing polocrosse should be explored. If you have any specific ideas, please reach out to your local horse welfare officer or myself. The more we understand the safer we can make the sport for horse and rider.

UMPIRING

Update

Welcome to our monthly umpiring article, where we keep you updated on the latest rule changes, clarifications, and key focus areas for officiating. Umpiring plays a crucial role in ensuring fair, safe, and high-quality gameplay, and staying informed benefits everyone— from players and coaches to officials and spectators. Each month, we'll cover important rule updates, common misconceptions, and tips to improve game management. IN FOCUS - Rules 14d and 14e / 15b and 15c

The Umpires Committee have asked that we shine a light over rules 14(D) & (E) as well as 15(B) & (C).

Rule 14d - A player that doubles up in a team at the beginning of a tournament, must play as a number 2 (two) in the lower graded team; providing that no pool player is available to fill that position.

So, if a player is playing for two teams in the one carnival, the player MUST be number two in the lower graded team, however if there is a pool player who can fill the position, the player is not allowed to double up.

Rule 14e - A player that doubles up in the same team at the beginning of a tournament, must play as a number 2 (two) in one of the sections.

If a player is doubling up in the same team from the when the carnival starts, the player must play a 2 in one of the positions

Rule 15b – When a substitute player is played, the substitute player shall be equal to or less than the goal rating of the player being replaced.

When the substitute player is played, the player coming in must be an equal or lesser grading than the player that was replaced. A team cannot draft a gun player into play in place of a novice who may need to be substituted. The current grading list is available on the website and updated monthly.

Rule 15c - If a player that has already taken part in a tournament is unable to play for any reason, the player may be replaced by a member who by the rules is qualified.

The explanation is the same as 15b – equal or less grading as the player being swapped, guns for guns, novices for novices and in betweens for in betweens.

COACHING

Update

The Coaching committee has requested that all coaches be reminded that coaches are required to log their coaching hours.

It is a requirement that each coach logs minimum hours as per below:

- Level 1 coaches must log 24 hours in 4 years
- Level 2 coaches must log 48 hours in 4 years

Please note that due to covid all coaches expiry dates were extended, this means majority of our coaches accreditation is now overdue.

The committee will be going through and checking logbooks and those that have not logged hours will face losing their accreditation. Please have this done by 1st November 2025.

Below are instructions how to log hours.

Please also remember accreditations will only be renewed with the supply of a current Working with Children number. This is a requirement for renewal and is not a hard process. We have listed the steps below as well.

STEPS TO LOG COACHING HOURS

To update your coaching hours on the NSW Polocrosse on-line membership portal

1. Login
2. Click on "personal Functions
3. Click "View & Change Details
4. Then "Grades & History"
5. Go to "Coaches Log" at the bottom of the page
6. Click "Edit Coaches Log"
7. Add your coaching activity
& how many hours (Please log any form of coaching or Personal Coaching Development even non- Polocrosse hours)

STEPS TO ACQUIRING A WORKING WITH CHILDREN NUMBER.

1. Log on to www.service.nsw.gov.au/transaction/apply-for-a-working-with-children-check
2. Select the 'Apply online' button.
3. Complete the online form ensuring the name you enter matches your identity documents exactly.
4. Visit a Service NSW Centre to present your original identity documents and (if applicable) pay the fee.

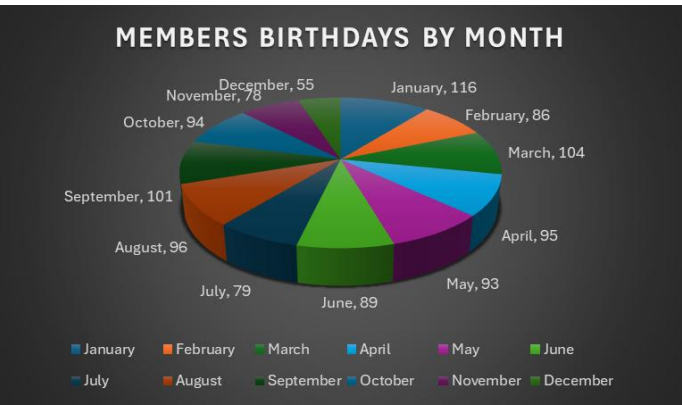
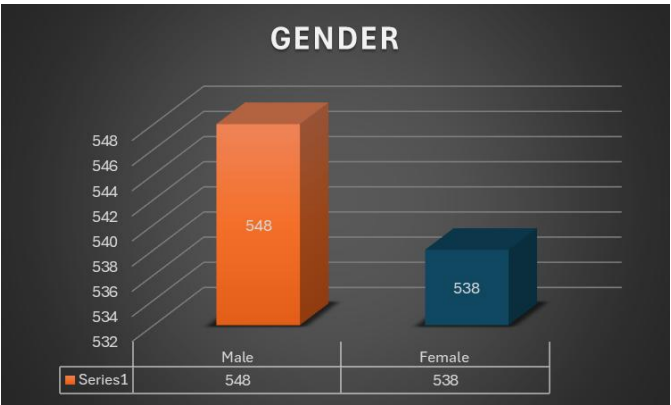
Note: Once you've provided your identity documents at the service centre, the National Police Criminal History check begins. This process can take up to 4 weeks.

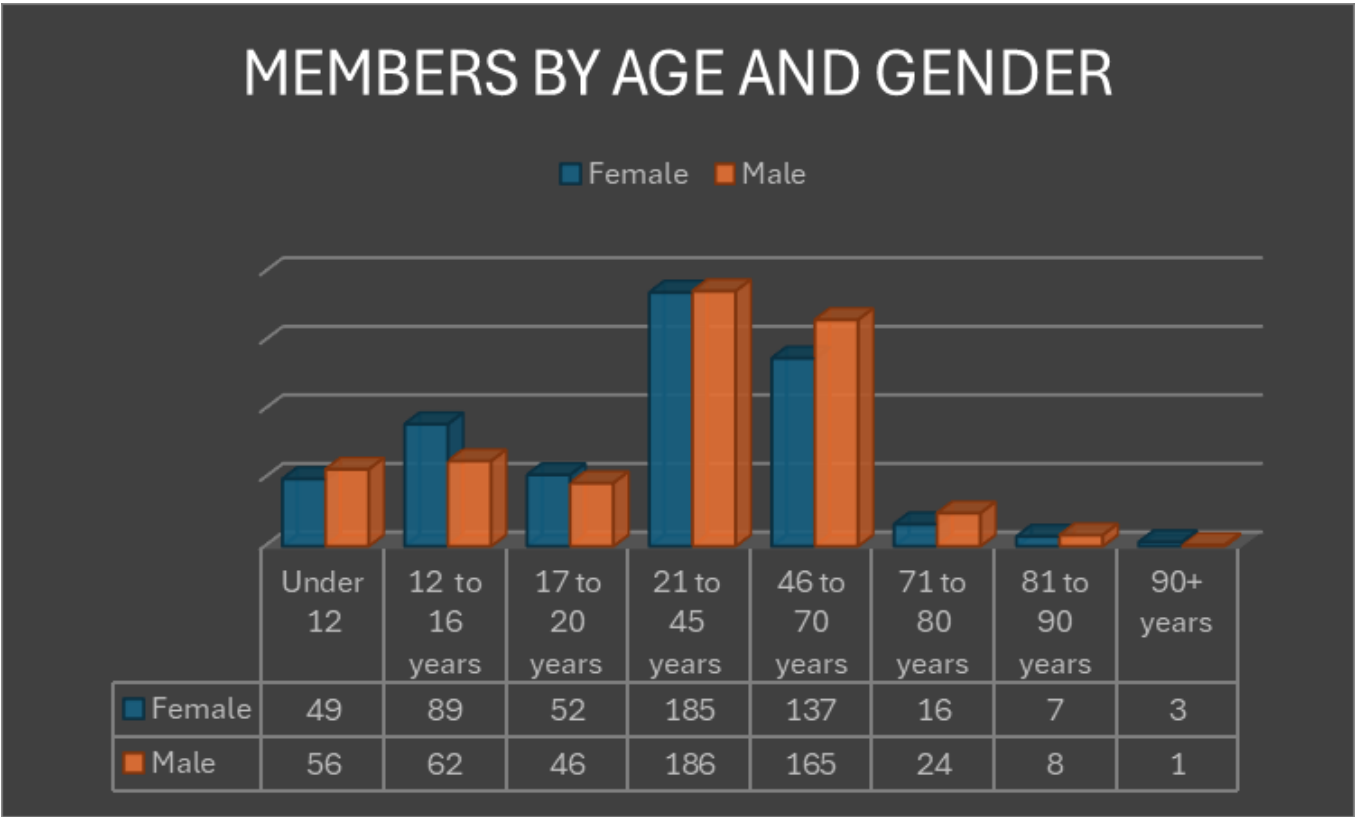
This month we jump into membership numbers and some interesting, and quirky facts that may surprise some.

An outsider's opinion.

As a newcomer to Polocrosse, I recognize that I don't yet have the depth of knowledge that many others in the sport possess. Polocrosse is a complex and multi-layered game, and I understand that gaining a full appreciation for it takes time and experience. However, I bring with me a long-standing background in sport, having spent many years at the forefront of many sporting associations and my experience is not clouded by long-standing assumptions, past grievances or internal politics.

That said, I'm always open to learning from those with more experience and different perspectives. So each edition, I will share my thoughts on something Polocrosse, you may like it, you may not however I welcome the discussion.

My favourite saying in the whole world is: ***"If you always do what you've always done, you will always get what you've always got."*** I think Henry Ford may have coined it, but I learned it from my old man, which is a bit ironic, because he's a Holden man through and through and hasn't changed his mind on that since he bought a baby blue '56 FJ as a younger man.

So, what has that got to do with polocrosse?

Well, here's the thing: since getting into this sport, I've had plenty of people far more experienced and knowledgeable than me tell me things like *"but that's how we've always done it"* or *"no Dan, this is the way we did it last time."*

Take multi-horse events as a simple example. I've heard arguments both for and against their introduction into the sport. Some people embrace them, wanting them at more (if not all) carnivals, while others avoid them like one should my wife's lasagna. Either way, the important part is this: every opportunity for change should be considered and weighed and not discounted because it is different.

I don't have a strong opinion either way on multi-horse, other than believing that if something is the way forward, it shouldn't come at the expense of the past. The middle ground is where the real answer usually lies. But this article isn't really about multi-horse events. It's about change and progression. And in polocrosse, there's plenty of opportunity to explore doing things differently.

Because let's be honest: this is the best sport most people have never heard of.

I don't claim to have the answers, but I do know this: change is inevitable. If we don't adapt, the world around us will change anyway and we risk being left behind. That doesn't mean throwing everything out and starting from scratch. That's not change; that's a reset. Instead, it's about looking at where we are, seeing what opportunities are in front of us, and asking:

- How can we do things differently?
- How can we do things better?
- How can we do things in a way that aligns with the world we live in today?

It's about thinking outside the square. Being deliberate in finding change rather than waiting for the sport to naturally evolve. We don't have time to just wait. We need to find ways to adapt polocrosse to a short attention span, social media savvy, time poor society that is usually sporting a dodgy mullet, a lacklustre moustache, maybe coloured hair and that many piercings that they can pick up FM radio.

Cricket managed it with 20/20, and it's been a booming success. AFL tried a similar experiment, and it failed miserably. But the point is, they were willing to challenge the good in search of the great. Maybe, just maybe, that's exactly what polocrosse needs too. Perhaps we need to build change into what we do, developing new concepts while still honouring what got us here in the first place.

By all means change, however the DNA of what we do must remain unaltered.

It's a fine balancing act, but trying new things is the only way to discover our true capabilities. If we continue doing only the familiar and the easy, we'll always know what to expect. 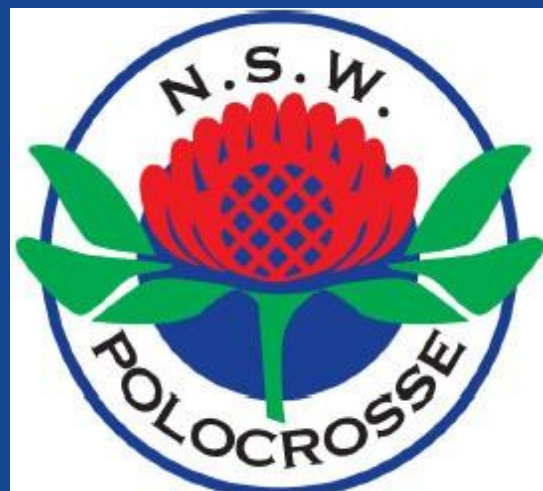
